   Beth had an example of an existing short sleeve T-shirt of heavy cotton and good quality with our insignia from a previous offering.

Dave Wanucha made a motion that we convene a committee to agree/design an insignia and determine an offering for club members to consider for the next meeting. Paul Purdue, seconded the motion. Paul has costed and assessed how to go about this process. See Paul for details.


- <u>Treasury Report:</u> David Wanucha reported that the club has \$2800 in our bank account and that there were no disbursements over the last year.
